

Golden Memories




Bett Hogg, alias Mrs Ferrier, popped into the Gothenburg recently and brought some fascinating memorabilia for us to share.

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Art Classes Blossoming

The Prestoungrange Art Classes have been a runaway success over the last year and the work produced will be on show at a spring exhibition at the re-opened Gothenburg – details are announced this week.

Established with the help of a £1,800 Millennium grant, the art classes are held every Thursday in the Lindsay Suite of the Cockenzie Centre under the able leadership of Andrew Crummy.

A batik class has just started with well-known Cockenzie artist Fiona Crombie who also hopes to run stained glass workshops in the future. Bag-piping and writing classes are also in the planning stages.

The Prestoungrange Arts Festival is to underwrite classes at the centre at least until the end of 2004. This offers a great opportunity for other local arts groups to use the centre for minimal cost.

To celebrate the success of the art class, we are introducing a regular Prestoungrange Artist Award which will always be announced in Brushstrokes.

The first Award's nominee is June Morgan of Prestonpans. She has discovered her true talent and is creating some amazing

Annual Bursary for Local Artists

Tales of a fascinating book on Prestonpans history are to fund a new annual Burriss Bursary for the benefit of local artists starting this summer.

An Historical Survey of Prestonpans is the book and it is a faithful re-creation of the 1930's paintings and writing of Jeanette Margeurite Burriss. Jeanette grew up in the town and qualified as a teacher before continuing on to art college. No grants were available at that time and she had to go to London to apply for a bursary to allow her to continue her studies in Edinburgh.

During her final year, she decided to use Prestonpans as the focus for her dissertation and produced a splendid set of paintings of the town's landmarks, each accompanied by a brief history.

Jeanette went on to become an art teacher and died in 1993. The material in the book was kindly donated by her sister, Madge Henderson, a Prestonpans resident.

In her time, Jeanette was unable to get funding locally for her studies, but seventy years on the annual £2,000 bursary is being set up in her honour and funded through the sale of the book.

My Swedish Adventure by Tom Ewing

Last July the Lord Mayor of Gothenburg in Sweden visited Prestonpans to unveil a new mural and to name the Lord Mayor's Bar upstairs at our Gothenburg.

I was commissioned to capture the essence of that day in two broadly similar paintings, one for the Lord Mayor and one to hang for ever in the bar! It was decided that since I'd painted it I had better be the one to travel to Goteborg, as it is spelt in Sweden, to give it to the Lord Mayor... just in case there was feedback!

I arrived at Goteborg's City Hall at 3.40pm on the 19th December to meet the Lord Mayor, Jorgen Linder and his wife Lisbeth, and it was straight onto the wine. What great hosts!

After showing me around the truly impressive City Hall -and another glass of wine - we set off for the centre of town. We took a tram to the City's historic Liesberg theme park where every tree was covered in thousands of white lights. It was absolutely stunning.

Afterwards we went for a meal in an Italian restaurant. The food was excellent and more wine flowed. The Lord Mayor explained the relationship between his town and the Gothenburg pubs in Scotland. He also expressed his pleasure at having visited Prestonpans in July, saying he was made to feel very welcome indeed.

During a slight lull in the conversation I leaned over and said in an overly loud voice: "Henrik Larsson"? The response was certainly positive. "Ah Henke, ya" (in Sweden Larsson is evidently known as Henke) and the Lord Mayor is a very big football fan! We had a good long chat about Sweden's chances in Portugal; and from there the conversation flowed from football to art and back to football.

They really were excellent hosts, and it was an honour to have painted for them and to have spent the afternoon and dusk with them both. It was one of the strangest days of my life, and I have to say I enjoyed every minute of it. Goteborg isn't cheap, but it is very beautiful and the people are very friendly. I'm saving up to go back.

Painted Ceilings - Old and New!

The famous Prestoungrange Ceiling is the subject of two of the Arts Festival's latest projects – a book and a mural.

The ancient ceiling came to light 40 years ago during alteration work to Prestoungrange House by its current occupants, the Royal Musselburgh Golf Club. It dates back to 1581 and is the earliest dated example of a Renaissance painted ceiling in Scotland. During its restoration it was moved to the Council Chamber at the top of Napier University's Merchiston Tower.

The Painted Ceiling of Prestoungrange is the 17th in the series of historical publications produced by the Prestoungrange Arts Festival Society – available at £6 per copy as are all the earlier volumes. It has been written by Prestonpans author Annemarie Allan: "It's been fascinating to research the background to this ceiling," she said. "Although it was common for ceilings to be decorated in the 16th century there are many unique aspects to this work, and I'm delighted to have been able to document it in such detail. Even though the original ceiling can't be seen locally now, it's still a very important artistic link to our area."


To celebrate the connection today, a new Prestoungrange Ceiling is being created in the James Fewell Bar of the renovated Gothenburg. The painter is the well-known local muralist Andrew Crummy who has already been responsible for several of the other Prestoungrange murals. It has all the key elements from the original ceiling plus a number of new images from Prestoungrange today. These include portraits of David Spence who founded the Heritage Museum; Provost Pat O'Brien; a craftsmen working on The Gothenburg's restoration and both the 1st and 14th Barons of Prestoungrange.

The Gothenburg's own Prestoungrange Ceiling is sure to be a real talking point for visitors.

New Generation of Fewells at the Goth

As the first manager of The Gothenburg – or Trust Tavern as it was known then – James Fewell holds a very special place in the pub's long history. And now his descendants are to play a role in its re-opening.

As Foundation Manager from 1908 until 1927, he was in charge during the only other time in its history when it was run under the charitable Gothenburg principles. So important was his influence that for the future the main bar in The Gothenburg has been named after him.

James' relatives now live far and wide in Scotland and beyond, but they contacted the Arts Festival after surfing onto the Prestoungrange website @ www.prestoungrange.org

The outcome was a visit to The Goth by two of James' grandchildren, Patricia and Eric, on December 17th and they have promised to return to take part in re-launch festivities in May.

Patricia now also plans to organise a Fewell Day and gather as many of her clan as possible once The Goth is up and running.
